Fire danger is **MODERATE** for all of Vermont except the southernmost counties where skies have remained overcast today. The light rain that fell yesterday only served to dampen fuels in the short term. Partly sunny skies and warm temps in northern Vermont are starting to dry fuels. Winds are strongest in eastern Vermont.

Clouds will thicken later this afternoon and tonight. Showers will arrive overnight with little to none in southern Vermont to .30" near the Canadian border. Skies will clear out during the day tomorrow. Winds will become very gusty in western Vermont during the afternoon ahead of more light and scattered showers overnight tomorrow night. Temps tomorrow will be above normal. Fire danger will be **MODERATE** for most of the state. Western Vermont could see **HIGH** depending on rain amounts and winds.




