Fire danger today is **LOW**. Rain and snow showers over the last few days along with high Rh, overcast skies and cool temps has kept fire danger low. Winds are very strong however. Warm temps on Saturday and significant moisture has sparked greening statewide which will continue to have a moderating affect on fire danger especially in the Champlain and Connecticut River valleys and southern Vermont. Greenup is not as advanced in higher elevations and north central/northeastern Vermont. Open burning is allowed where fuels and winds are favorable.

Tomorrow will be a dry day with more seasonal temperatures. Rh will not be as high as today but winds will continue to be gusty. Fire danger will be moderate statewide and higher in areas where greenup is not as advanced.
